Jill Cole, President of RHA, said their goal amount of money to raise is \$2,000 or more, with all the proceeds going to a breast cancer organization through Syracuse University Hospital. Cole said, "RHA and NRHH are sister organizations, so they usually work together for events, but this is the first time we are working with CSA for an event, and it has been a success.'

Lima Stafford, a CSA member said, "I like that we're doing something different by collaborating with the residence halls. Now we can have a bigger event and bring even more people out."

Alumni Laura Buitrago will compete in the San **Diego Marathon**

Cortland Alumni and former member of the Sigma Delta Tau sorority, Laura Buitrago won't hesitate to admit that she was no athlete while at Cortland. In fact, when she first decided to give running a try last fall she could barely run two miles.

This Spring, Buitrago, a Long Island resident, will be competing in the San Diego Marathon as a member of The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society's Team in Training, an international running club that raises money for Leukemia and Lymphoma research.

Team in Training helps individuals complete their goal of completing either a marathon, half marathon, triathlon, century ride(100 mile bike ride) or hiking adventure. In exchange for pledging to raise funds for the society during your training, they provide their athletes with everything from

Speaker explains hardships of slaves and the **Underground Railroad**

"Do you remember the ancestors? It means that we are aware, for we did not make ourselves. It's easy to forget, we were not the first to suffer. Forget and die," sang Vanessa Johnson to set the mood for her presenta-

tion entitled: "Freedom Aprons." Vanessa Johnson is a Griot, or African story teller. She uses her research of slaves in the Syracuse area in order to raise awareness about the role the city of Syracuse played in freeing slaves using the Underground Railroad. Johnson dressed in "slave garb" which was a basic grey, long sleeved dress that drooped down to her feet. She also wore an orange,

brown, and yellow head wrap. Johnson is the creator of the "Imagine Syracuse" program that exposes 4th, 5th, and 6th graders to college campuses in Syracuse. The purpose is to motivate young children to attend college after high school. Some of these children also at-

Johnson proceeded to literally act out the feelings and emotions of slaves and slave masters. Each "act" featured a different person that existed during slave times. Her first story started off with three separate "toots" that were used to notify other members of the railroad that slaves were com-

tended Johnson's presentation.

ing through. Johnson took the role of a young girl that had to get the blankets for the slaves that were jumping off the trains that passed through Syracuse. She embodied the emotion of the young girl as she acted out the situation. Johnson also took the role of

a fleeing slave mother who ran from her slave plantation with her husband and newborn son. The act depicted the family making it to Syracuse after much difficulty, but after a few months the Federal government passed the Fugitive Slave Act of 1850, which required all runaway slaves to be returned to their previous masters.

The family fled north to Canada but during the journey the couple lost their baby and tried to commit suicide from grief. This is just one of the many difficult situations slaves faced when trying to run away. Johnson stirred many emo-

Are you looking for a way to become more involved in what goes on at Cortland? Have you always wanted to be part of an important decision making process? If so, then Judicial Affairs wants you.

We are looking for a diverse group of student, faculty, and staff to serve as justices on the Judicial Review Board (JRB) and College Hearing Panel (CHP) for the 2010-2011 academic year. This is a great way to get more involved in the college community.

As justices, members of the panel listen to respondent and witness testimony, review evidence provided to the hearing board, and ultimately decide whether or not a student is in violation of school policy.

Justices hear cases dealing with all aspects of the Code of Student Conduct, from alcohol and drug policy to physical assault. If a student is found in violation, the justices decide what educational sanctions will be imposed to ensure the safety of the campus community.

While student justices gain valuable experience and understanding of how the college judicial system works, they have the opportunity to receive one credit for each semester of their involvement. Student justices attend monthly training sessions and participate in about three to four hearings a semester involving alleged violations of the Code of Student Conduct.

As members on the panel, faculty and staff are provided an opportunity to positively interact with student justices and also have a role in educating students

outside the classroom or office. The voluntary participation of faculty and staff members is vital to the judicial process and it also provides them with a great opportunity to become more involved with campus and student life.

Current student justices participate because they have an interest in the judicial system and want to ensure a fair process for all respondents. Being a student justice is also a great resume builder and the communication skills attained in the group setting are an asset to any future employment. Students of all majors are encouraged to apply.

running partners and coaches, to mentors and running apparel.

It wasn't until she completed her first half marathon that she built up the courage to sign up and begin attending Team in Training meetings.

When she first signed up, Buitrago's main goal was to get back in shape. However, just a few weeks into the program she found a higher calling.

'At one of my first meetings, a cancer survivor came to speak to us about how she won her battle with cancer, and is currently training for a triathlon," says Buitrago. "To see a woman who was once bed ridden persevere and compete as an athlete really makes you think anything is possible."

Team in Training has provided Buitrago with a customized training program that works around her full time substitute job during the day and graduate courses at night.

"We generally have the athletes train on a 16 to 24 week program (for a marathon) but we customize each of them based on individual goals and special needs," said nine year Team in Training running Coach Carmen Cruz.

The particular team Buitrago trains with is composed of college students, former athletic standouts, and single mothers, as well as members in their 50's and 60's all with varying degrees running experience. As diverse as the members of the team are, their reasons for joining are equally as diverse.

Some joined to lose weight, others wanted to raise money, and others have always dreamed of running a marathon," said Cruz. With weekly team runs, and

clinics explaining running form, race strategy and cross training, among other topics, Team in Training aims at adequatepreparing every member.

Laura is relatively new to the program but has been adapting really well and really seems to be enjoying the program," says Cruz. "I can't wait for her and my other athletes to complete their goals; it's priceless to see."

With the race day of June 5 fast approaching, Buitrago isn't sure whether it's running the marathon or raising the money that has her the most scared. but she finds comfort in knowing that she isn't in it alone.

"Whether it's cancer patients or athletes, the whole idea of Team in Training is that you don't have to go through it alone. You have people with you to support you and motivate you," said Buirtago.

Recent string of sexual assults remind students to protect themselves

Within a 16-day time span, three sexually-related incidents occurred in the city of Cortland against three Cortland students. On January 28, a female Cortland student was sexually assaulted in the Groton Avenue area. The suspect was known to the victim and has been referred to Judicial Affairs.

About two weeks later, another female student reported that she had been raped in an on-campus residence hall in the early morning hours of February 12. The suspect has been identified and was known to the victim prior to the incident.

In the early morning hours of February 13, a female student was raped in a residence location off-campus, located in the area of Prospect Terrace. This suspect was also known to the victim prior to the incident.

portant to note that the suspect was known to the victim before the assault took place. Assistant Chief of Police, Mark DePaull said, "We need to understand that it's still a misconception that most sexual assaults occur from the attacker hiding in the bushes. Stranger sexual assaults do occur, but the vast majority of sexual assaults are committed by some-one who is known to the victim."

He reported that the National Crime Victimization Survey revealed that 73 percent of sexual assaults were perpetrated by a "non-stranger." Cortland takes students'

safety seriously, and the professionally trained University Police officers patrol the campus by foot, bike and vehicle 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The college starts programming efforts at the new student Orientation Program and continues throughout the year with guest speakers and peer education.

gression Defense System is a program of realistic self-defense tactics and techniques for women.

DePaull gave tips to students to avoid unfortunate incidences like the ones that have occurred in the past month. To defend yourself against stranger sexual assaults, DePaull says, "walk in groups, do not walk in dark areas, stay away from areas where someone could hide, be aware of the locations of the blue light emergency phones, let someone know where you will be and trust your instincts."

He also reminded students to limit their alcohol consumption because alcoholic beverages are considered the most widely used "date rape" drug and are readily available. He said to be confident in your principles regarding sexual activity; both parties need to communicate and set up parameters.

Remember that "no" means "no," and it is not up for interpretation or debate. Sexual activity in the past does not mean it is permissible now. Also, be cautious of new acquaintances, espe-

The most affected and devastated local businesses in this situation are those that sell specific items like jewelry, hardware, apparel, and groceries, because Wal-Mart offers all of these things at a lower price and all under the same roof. If "onestop shopping" ever needed an advocate, Wal-Mart would be the clear choice.

Ok, so these are the

unambiguous negatives that Wal-Mart enforces on a local economy, but are there positives?

There appears to be one, which is the amount of jobs that a Wal-Mart provides. It is estimated that a Wal-Mart employs between 150-350 people.

In an area like Cortland, this is a big deal, and the opening of the new store on Rt. 281 definitely opened up job opportunities that didn't exist previously. However, keep in mind that these positions often pay minimum wage, and that there are people out there that either run or work at small businesses that are losing their jobs at the same time others are gaining them.

That's right, the very same thing that hurts the local business, benefits the local consumer; a conundrum so intricate that I'm left contemplating the American consumer system. If you're

strictly a consumer, a new Wal-Mart is a positive thing. If you are a small business owner specializing in the sale of any of the products that Wal-Mart offers, then a new Wal-Mart is a negative thing

Whichever title you individually fit into will most likely dictate your opinion of what Wal-Mart is doing to America. The new Wal-Mart in Cortland is still in its preliminary months of operation, meaning that the citizenry still possesses an infatuation for a new option.

These first few months are definitely the hardest for any local business, especially ones that sell similar products or provide similar services to that of the super retail store. Some stores will inevitably close, while others will experience a large decline in revenue and sales.

But let's say we look into the future at the Wal-Mart situation in Cortland. In a few years from now—after Wal-Mart has firmly established that it is the head retailer and many small businesses have closed—other stores, shops, and businesses that offer products and/or services that

This might just indicate the circle of life in American capitalism. It is not so much survival of the fittest, but rather survival of the company that offers something Wal-Mart doesn't.

That's right, Wal-Mart has made it to the top of our capitalistic food chain, and local economies will be forced to adapt and act accordingly. "Save money, live better." As a consumer, I can't argue with that.


It just goes to show that if you want your movie to have a better chance of winning an Oscar, add in as much drama and romance as

It debuted number one on the U.S. Billboard 200 and number one in 18 other countries. Bieber's success has made him the youngest solo male act to top the charts since Stevie Wonder in 1963 and his success is only going to expand.

Bieber has performed at various events.
