#### **Inaugural Season Deemed a Success**

When it was first announced that there would be a new flag football league in Cortland, New York, critics far and wide were quick to pass judgment on how they felt the

league would do in it's inaugural season.

At the season's conclusion, some of the league's harshest critics appear to be eating their words, as the Cortland Area Flag Football League (C.A.F.F.L.) announced that it was profitable in it's first season.

In numbers released stri this week, the League showed that it maintained excellent ticket sales throughout the season, as well as solid merchandise and concessions sales.

past year, and League officials hope to increase registration numbers for 2012, possibly reaching a total league enrolment of 30 teams.

get enough C.A.F.F.L. in 2011.

#### Forte Yard Dash" Wins First Ever C.A.F.F.L. Championship

"Somebody has to win the first one, why not us?" team co-captain Nate Fish said before Sunday's first ever Cortland Area Flag Football League Championship. Well Nate, the trophy is yours.

After one of the most improbable post season runs in recent history, the eighth seed team in this years playoffs, "Forte Yard Dash" did what nobody thought possible: they won it all.

Behind an improved passing attack that kept opponent "It's On Like Ndamukong" on it's heels all day, and a stifling defense that only allowed 4 first downs throughout the game, "Forte" proved that it was more than deserving of it's championship bid.

Named after the popular NFL running back Matt Forte, the squad came into the weekend with many questions surrounding it, the most significant of which regarding starting wide receiver and cornerback Nate Fish.

Fish, despite league officials' concern, dressed for the game, and made his presence felt early, with a 19 yard touchdown catch from quarterback Ben Bowers in the first quarter, and an interception return for a touchdown in the third quarter, as opposing quarterback Kevin Andersen attempted to lead his team down the field and back into contention.

Unfortunately, the win was bittersweet for Fish, who reinjured his neck.

#### Tough Break for "It's On Like Ndamukong"

Legendary football coach Vince Lombardi once said: "Winning isn't everything, it's the only thing." After a tough loss Sunday, it appears that title favorite "It's On Like Ndamukong" felt the same way.

After cruising to an impressive regular season, and flattening foes in the playoffs like they were standing still, "Ndamukong" arrived at the C.A.F.F.L.'s title game as a heavy favorite. They were favored by odds makers to win by 12 points, a large margin by today's football standards.

Unfortunately, things did not go as

planned on the field, as "Ndamukong" was thoroughly outplayed in almost every facet of the game.

A disappointed Kevin Andersen, who quarterbacked for the team during the game, expressed how he felt after the defeat: "We gave it all we had today, and have no regrets. ("Forte Yard Dash") was one heck of a football team, and our hats are off to those guys. They beat us fair and square."

#### Nate Fish "Speechless" After Latest Injury

Sacrifice and football go hand in hand. "Forte Yard Dash" cornerback/wide receiver Nathan "Nate" Fish understands this more than most.

After another devastating injury in Sunday's C.A.F.F.L. Championship game, many are wondering if they will ever see the star take to the field again. Fish was injured on a crossing route, when quarterback Ben Bowers stared down the speedy receiver before throwing a lofted pass in his direction, allowing the opposing safety to get a running start at Fish.

When the two collided mid-air, it was immediately obvious that the "Forte" playmaker was in serious pain.

This is hardly new for number twentyfour, as he has been oft-injured in his short career, most recently with back spasms two weeks ago during the divisional round of the C.A.F.F.L. playoffs.

However, Fish managed to play again after a torn ACL during high school, so nobody is counting him out for another comeback. An unfazed, confident Fish said after the injury: "I'll take it."

#### **Players Excited After Initial Season**
